
Posada

Yes, it will be more expensive than an easy jet flight and yes, it will take longer.

<u>Congratulations and well deserved</u> to one of our long-serving Trustees Ruth Davies, who has received the Order of St Ethelbert from the Diocese of Hereford for her long leadership roles in our local village Church, St Mary's.

The History of Everest Hall from an article written by Mrs Nancy Cummins in 1975.

Llanfair Waterdine Church of England School was built about 1850 of local stone with a high pitched slate roof. It consisted of a rectangular main room, about 60ft by 17ft with a small lobby or extra classroom on the north side near the east end.

Attached to the East end of the main building was a three bedroom Head Master's House.

Between the North wall of the school and the road was a playground. About 1900, an extra classroom was thrown out at the west end, divided from the main room by sliding glass and wooden doors. About 1947 came a threat of closure. A few years later, the number of pupils having been greatly reduced by all the "over elevens" being transferred to Knighton "Secondary Modern" or Presteigne "Grammar" Schools, Llanfair Waterdine became a one teacher school. In 1960 the school finally closed. The school was the only meeting place for all the village functions and in August 1960, a public meeting was called to decide what could be done. We had hoped that the building would revert to the village, but we were told that if we wanted it we would have to pay £200 for it, a large sum in those days for such a small community to find.

To be continued in the next edition to find out what happened in 1961.

Do come along and see for yourselves if much has changed. We have tried to keep all the old values of past Trustees, their hopes and ours for the future. Thanks to our regular groups and a huge thank you to the new ones for giving us a try and if there is anyone who has a hobby or a talent they wish to share please contact us and we will help to form a group.

Llanfair Waterdine PCC is most grateful for the support given to our church. 22 attended the last Compline and the previous two Reflection services both had a congregation of 40. 73 people came to Harvest and 25 to Remembrance. I am sure there will be many at the Christmas services. A working day was

held recently when a surprise gift for those attending the Christmas services, was made. We are trying to find ways of using the church in less structured ways for people to drop in, but are restricted by a lack of comfortable, communal seating, water and a toilet. At present, there is a service every Sunday, apart from fifth Sundays, plus extra weekday services. We hope that this can continue.

The Diocese now wants all 'lay' people who lead services to undergo DBS checks, safeguarding training and a certificated course in 'lay service leading' This will be time consuming and may not be possible for all.

It has been decided to re-start the local Christmas Card delivery service. There will be a post-box by the entrance to the Everest Hall from December 3rd, the Llanfair Singers' Concert – to 20th, the annual Carol Service at St Mary's Church. Rev'd Martin writes

We all know something of the Christmas story. On a dark night, in a place far from home, a young mother, isolated from those who had previously surrounded her with love and comfort, gave birth to a baby. They were so impoverished that the baby was wrapped in the crudest and most basic of cloth, and was laid to rest and sleep in an animals' feeding trough. Not only did the child have to survive unsanitary conditions, but later in its' infanthood, soldiers rampaged through the town where the family had taken refuge and slaughtered each male infant they found. The family had fled, and like so many peoples who risk death in journeys as migrants, they sought shelter in another country. Eventually they returned and settled with family, but doubtless, were unable to forget their time of fear and terror.

The Christmas story is retold year after year in nativity plays, readings, carol services and stories are told to children in homes and beds, bedecked with presents and decorations. We are often told that Christmas has its origins in pagan festivals which celebrated the return of light. Light, which has lessened through the last months of the year, and which perceptibly begins to return, heralding the beginning of spring and the return of greening nature. Light is both important in a real physical sense, and also metaphorically. Not only is it a symbol of faith and belief, but it is symbol of love. The love which is pure and devoted, like that of a mother towards her baby.

Love endures all things, we are told in 1 Corinthians 13, believes all things, and keeps no account of wrongs. Love persists, when logic and reason say 'turn away'.

Christmas can be almost unbearably painful for many people. Memories of seasons past can haunt, just as reminders of lost loved ones, or of love that has gone, can numb even the minds of even the most cynical or hardened of characters.

When I think of light in this context, I am reminded of the sight as I drove back to the Theological College where I trained. It was on the other side of the Pennines, and as I drove along the M62, we would look over towards the towns of Halifax, Bradford and Huddersfield, and see hundreds and thousands of lights. Street lights, lights from houses and factories, and car lights, and I wondered what the ratio was of lights to people. Vast areas were defined by so many lights, shining in the darkness.

This year may be terribly hard for many people. As communities and as a society we now have an opportunity to demonstrate a real sense of love and compassion to those less fortunate than ourselves. Although many of us are and have been generous, now is a time to be more generous, if many are to remain warm and fed.

I wish all a happy and blessed Christmas, to both those with plenty, and those who are without.

Di Cook and Andrea Evans



RL: Thanks, both, for agreeing to see me for this conversation for LT. I wanted to begin by asking how long it is that you have lived in Llanfair.

AE: It is two years last month (October).

RL: What brought you to Llanfair? You were living abroad weren't you?

DC: We had been watching property online and liked the rural look of Llanfair. Nothing else had come up which caught our eye.

AE: We were stuck in Portugal and about to be homeless, having looked for property there. We couldn't get the flights out and had a dog, four cats and three parrots! We came up with the bright idea that we would charter a private jet! It was an AMAZING experience. We were in our glad-rags and everyone was looking at us as we were treated royally and escorted to the aircraft. No hanging about, either. The aircraft took off within ten minutes.

We landed in Bristol and went to stay in Swansea, my home town, although after the seamless flight the hire-car failed to materialise. However, the flight from Portugal was an experience that you couldn't make up!

One of our sisters, who knew we were looking for another home, had viewed Ladycroft for us and then we came to see it but another offer had been put in on it. However, those people withdrew and the agent contacted us again. We loved this house and went for it. Six weeks later we moved in.

DC: We like Llanfair Waterdine and the peace. We get on with everyone and enjoyed having neighbours and friends for a barbeque on 3 September. It wasn't a bad evening, weather wise, and everyone seemed to have a good time. There were about 40 people, all told.

RL: It was a great evening and a lovely mix of people. I fell for the baked bananas with cream floating in Tia Maria!

RL: You've done such a lot here.

ROAST TURKEY TIPS

My go-to place for any recipe is The Guardian website and Nigel Slater's guide to making the perfect turkey dinner is summarised below. It's what we will be doing come the day!

"I choose a smaller turkey, one under 5kg in weight. Such a bird will feed 10.

I, somewhat controversially, use goose fat, smearing the breast and legs generously, then basting regularly with hot fat and juices from the roasting tin as it cooks. The argument that I am using a fat from a different bird rather falls apart when you note that butter doesn't come from a turkey either, and anyway, the result – a bird of supreme savour and succulence – is worth it. I do stuff my bird, but only enough to half-fill the cavity; the rest of the stuffing is cooked separately. And yes, cranberry sauce, gravy and roast potatoes are essential, cooking the latter round the bird if there's room, in a separate tin if not. Little sausages, wrapped in bacon, are a delicious extra.

For the stuffing sweet potatoes 1kg light open bread, such as ciabatta 200g pancetta, in the piece 250g olive oil 2 tbsp banana shallots 350g sausage meat 500g thyme leaves 2 tbsp sage leaves 6

For the turkey turkey 4.5kg goose fat 6 tbsp



Set the oven at 200C/gas mark 6. Peel the sweet potatoes, cut them into large pieces, then steam, in a steamer basket or a colander over boiling water, until very soft and crushable – 25 minutes or so. Tear the bread into postage-stamp-size pieces, scatter over a baking sheet and bake until dry and pale gold.

Cut the pancetta into 2cm cubes. Warm the oil in a frying pan, add the cubes of pancetta, and fry until fragrant and the fat has turned golden. Peel and finely chop the shallots. Remove the pancetta as soon as it is ready, then add the shallots to the pan. Break the sausage meat up, stir briefly into the ingredients in the pan, then set aside.

Mash the sweet potatoes roughly with a fork, then add the dried bread and the pancetta, the shallots, the thyme leaves and the sage, finely shredded. Season, mix thoroughly, then shape half the mixture into 16 balls, each slightly bigger than a golf ball. Stuff the remaining half of the mixture into the turkey, pushing it deep inside the body of the bird.

Let the turkey rest. Don't skip this, no matter how everyone pleads for their dinner

Place the turkey in a roasting tin, baste it generously with the goose fat and roast for 25 minutes. Lower the heat to 180C/gas mark 4 and continue roasting for a further 2 hours. Baste the breast of the turkey twice with the cooking juices from the roasting tin during this time. (Be quick, so the oven doesn't lose any heat.)

Halfway through roasting, when the bird has been cooking for about 75 minutes, turn it over and place the remaining balls of stuffing around the sides.

Alternatively, and this is what I often do, bake them in a little goose fat in a separate baking tin.

Remove the turkey from the oven and let it rest for 35-45 minutes. Don't skip this, no matter how everyone pleads for their dinner. I cannot emphasise this enough."

So, we should all have no problems, eh?

Seasonal Tips for the Gardener's Year

December is here already after what has been an extraordinary year. The summer weather was really memorable and, apart from the continual watering of pots, it was very pleasant not to have continuous cloud cover.

Now is the last chance to plant tulip bulbs for Spring flowering. It is also time to give the grass it's last cut for the winter this will also pick up any leaves that may be laying on the lawn. These can be added to the compost heap. Remember to avoid walking on the lawn when it is covered with frost.

Time to check hyacinth and other bulbs in pots which are being forced for early blooms.

Cut back a quarter of the old stems from blackcurrant bushes. It is also time to cover rhubarb to force young pink stems. Old rhubarb clumps which are large can be split and the younger outer portions replanted. Autumn raspberry canes which fruited this year can be cut down to ground level, making sure not to cut down new growth from summer fruiting varieties.

Cut back old perennial stems down to the ground and tidy up borders. Mulch around the plants. Cut off old leaves from hellebores which have black spots to stop this disease spreading to the flowers.

There is still time to plant garlic and shallots.

Lily bulbs can be planted in pots in January to fill the garden with fragrance in the Summer.

Keep dead heading winter pansies to keep them flowering and to stop them producing seed.

Check stored fruit and vegetables for rot which will spread quickly to adjoining produce.

Buy your flower and vegetable seeds early so that you have plenty of choice and buy the varieties you prefer.

This is my last "Seasonal Tips for the Gardener's Year". I have enjoyed writing my article for the Llanfair Times and I would now like to wish the readers a Happy Gardening Year for 2023.

Warm Hub

A meeting was held between a number of parish organisations to discuss the possibility of a "warm hub" in Llanfair. The feedback from the meeting was to discuss this further between the wider community. As a Trust, we would like to confirm we do have a category in which we can support groups, families or individuals who are in need due to exceptional or challenging circumstances. Therefore, we would just like to reiterate that people can reach out to us and we will endeavour to do what we can within our remit to support those in need.

We welcome any members of the Llanfair Parish or environs to write to us for support if they wish to apply for an award in the following target areas:

Applications will be considered for:

- **1.** Grants to individuals, families or groups on the basis of exceptional or challenging circumstances.
- **2.** Bursaries to young people to help them broaden their experiences and accomplishments.
- **3.** Partnerships with groups seeking similar goals to our own
- **4.** Sponsorship of projects that will be of sustainable benefit to the community.

Conservation Grant:

The management plan is in full swing. From a landscape conservation perspective, the broader area would have historically been heathland due to key features present. Ongoing and future management of The Triangle site should aim to enhance these features so that the site will continue to be of high biodiversity value in the landscape, both for nature conservation and visitor- enjoyment.

What makes The Triangle special?

Existing key features to enhance:

Diverse mixture of vegetation types, including heathers, gorses, grasses, some flowering plants, some tree cover and areas of open or bare ground. This mosaic of flora supports diverse number of birds, animals and insects.

Site survey in summer 2022: small area of bilberry halfway along the roadside which is most likely a remnant of the original moorland hilltop. There were small areas of bluebell and a few other acid grassland plants such as tormentil and heath bedstraw.

Variety of bird life

It is a valuable site for birds, providing cover for feeding and nesting.

Site survey in summer 2022 – range of species observed: Whitethroat, Chiffchaff, Stonechat with young, Bullfinch, Wheatear, Great tit, Blue tit, Redstart, Chaffinch and Meadow pipit.

We look forward to making a start in spring 2023.

Phonebox:

We would like to raise a question to the readers of the Llanfair Times. Recently it has been noted and shared with us that the Phonebox purchased by the Trust is starting to look "weathered" and is at risk of becoming a health and safety issue.

As a Trust we will be reviewing what to do next with the Phonebox as at the minute it is not benefitting the community in any way. If any parishioners can come up with a suggestion we would recommend either speaking to us in person, emailing us or posting a letter at the Community Pavilion for what you think the Phonebox could be used for. If we cannot find a suitable use for the Phonebox we may be forced to dispose of it.

From the Chairman of the Parish Council

This article will aim to cover some of the various things that the Parish Council has been involved with recently. I am firstly pleased that at our level of the political system (the very bottom), everything seems to be calm. For some time now we have had a full Council working well together, and kept nicely in order by our very efficient Clerk, Maggie Brown

I recently drove down to the village from Llanfair Hall end, and it was pleasing to see the two new dwellings with lights on. Both have been built under the Affordable Housing policy, which was strongly promoted a few years ago by the Parish Council. Well done to the new homeowners for persevering with the whole process and getting a great result. These homes will always be kept affordable, and should they ever be sold, will also go to people with local work and or family connections. These homes are an asset for the community which should be appreciated by all.

As we all know, 'Highways' is always a topic for us at our meetings. The Parish Council has been keeping up pressure on Shropshire Council to get potholes filled, and I'm pleased to say that recently quite a few have been repaired. However, we continue to push for overlaying, as we are conscious that we have roads that have been patched for several years and these are only temporary repairs. We will keep up the pressure but acknowledge that budgets are tight at the county level.

Now for broadband. Prior to our July meeting this year we had asked Airband for an update on the 'Fibre to the Premises' promised for all the remaining 70 odd homes in the Parish. We received a letter stating that Airband would have the whole system built by the end of August this year. The end of August arrived, and we had seen no action at all on the ground. The Clerk again wrote for an update, and we were informed that they had gone back to Shropshire Council to renegotiate the contract, due to a hike in costs. The Parish Council is very concerned about this and has written a strongly worded letter to both Airband and Shropshire Council. I can well remember when Llanfair Waterdine Parish Council began to actively push for better broadband, recognising just

how important it is. We will not give up, but we have certainly been let down with a great many false promises from both Shropshire Council and Airband.

One job that the Parish Council is tasked with is appointing Trustees to the Community Trust as required. We have been unsuccessful recently with posters and news alerts and had decided to advertise in the local paper. However, the cost was over what we had budgeted. Please would all readers consider whether they might like to join this very worthwhile community organisation. You would be part of a team managing mainly land assets and helping the community, in line with the mission statement and constitution. Please note, there are no restrictions as to where you live.

Readers will see that the Parish Council is conducting a survey with this December edition, to help them to formulate the most useful future for Llanfair Times. This seems sensible after six years, given the considerable effort and cost in producing and distributing the publication. Please take part in this process, as the more views received the better the result can be. A decision may be taken after discussion in our January meeting.

It would be encouraging to see members of the public asking the Clerk, or any Councillor for items to go on the agenda, attending meetings and making use of the public speaking section at the beginning of each meeting we hold. Alternatively, why not just email the Clerk with any comments you may have on what the Parish Council is doing.
